She likes example knitting, crocheting, baking, photography, riding and hiking.

Amanda's IFYE Article

I arrived to USA June 17th. The first few days I spent in Washington DC at orientation with other IFYEs. During the weekend I learnt a lot about other countries and got to tell about my country. We also learnt about IFYE program and what to do if we face problems.

On Monday my real adventure started when I flew into St. Louis. At the airport I met the Illinois State Coordinator, Susan, and we had to wait for the other IFYE, Amanda, to arrive. We spent a few hours together and got to know each other a little bit before it was time to meet the first family that lived nearby St. Louis. From the moment I met my first family everything went better than I had imagined.

With my first family we went to St. Louis a few times and I got to see the zoo, Anheuser-Busch brewery, Soulard farmers market, the Arch (which is designed by Finnish Eero Saarinen) and a lot of other places. I also got to go to Cardinals game. It was my first time ever at American baseball game and I enjoyed it very much. It is one of the many things that I can experience only in the USA and I'm very thankful that I got the opportunity to do it.

I got to see different farms with my first family. For example, we went to a local dairy farm and there I learnt that some farmers cut their cows' tails here in US. That is only one of the thousands examples how I've learnt something new every day here. A few of the other things that I got to experience with my first family are Holiday World, Carlyle Lake dam tour, Aviston Zip Code Day, Catholic funeral, mud volleyball tournament and the 4th of July.

On July 16th time with my first family came to an end I moved on to the second family. They were a family of four living in Midwest Illinois. At their place I got to work with their Hereford cattle since the first day. My family in Finland has Herefords as well but most of the ways of doing things are very different so I learnt a lot of things I can do when I get back home. For example, I had never used blow dryer before but now I can say I'm kind of good at using it.

I did not only work with the second family even though I would not have minded that. We went to Burlington Bees game to see some more baseball. Even though their county fair was already over when I got there, we went to county fair in Champaign. At the Champaign County Fair my host family

introduced me traditional county fair things such as cattle shows, lemon shake-ups, corn dogs and funnel cakes.

I spent only a little under three weeks with the second family so soon it was time to move on again. This time arrived to a family of three in the northern Illinois. They have beef cattle but also two ponies and two horses that my host sister shows. First week with the third family we were busy with their county fair so I got to experience a lot more county fair things. Some of them were different 4H shows and projects, truck pull, tractor pull, demo derby and country music concert. After county fair we had only a few days before we went to the Illinois State Fair. Right before going to the State fair the school started and I went to a American high school for the first time in my life. I also had to wear a school uniform for the first time in my life.

At the State Fair I saw a lot of horse shows, I slept in the barn, I ate more fair food, met a lot of new people and went to the Little Big Town concert. After that it was time to go back to school.

I have a little over a week with the third family left and then my time as an IFYE is coming to its end. After leaving the third family I'll go to Indiana for about a week to visit my friend who was an IFYE two years ago in Finland. On September 12th it is time for me to leave USA for now but I'll come back as soon as I can.

I've liked every moment of my exchange and I could do this again thousand times because it is so worth it. I was the first exchange student ever for all of my families and I believe that they have enjoyed this experience as well.

Larry Mills

Larry Mills, 54 of Crescent City California died Friday July 29th in an airplane crash. He was an IL IFYE YDP to Thailand in 1987. Larry Mills was piloting a California – Oregon Life Flight when smoke in the cockpit forced him to turn around. Radar lost the plane soon after that. In addition to Mills, a flight nurse, transport medic and a patient died in the crash.

Mills family owns Mills Apple Farm in Marine, Illinois. His mother, Shirley was a 1955 IA IFYE to Germany who died in 2004.
