Mastering the Bounce

I was reading an article recently that talked about companies, entrepreneurs and leaders who experienced a bit of fall from grace. When down and out, they could have easily stayed there, given up hope, their dreams and themselves, but they didn't. Instead of collapsing, they *bounced*, and they came back stronger, better and more equipped to achieve greatness than ever before.

In this metaphor, let us become 'the ball', and visualize *The Bounce*. There are four distinct phases.

- 1. The Fall: Each day we experience minor setbacks in our lives that require us to bounce back. But there is a difference between falling and failing. *The Bounce* converts a fall into victory, and the harder we fall, the higher we can bounce.
- 2. The Impact: Making Impact, hitting bottom, bends us out of shape. We are tested and morphed. Do we allow the impact to explode us or absorb it and use it to spring? This smack of impact can be what musters the focus, energy and fight needed to become something we might never have driven ourselves to be otherwise. This impact creates the energetic force to launch us in opposite and positive directions.
- **3. Restoration:** The moment the ball begins to regain its shape is defined in our ability to rebound decisively, and restore our identity and sense of purpose. We stop mourning where we once were, and start focusing on where we are going.
- **4. Elevation:** We rise again ... and most often higher than we were before *The Bounce*. Most often it is because of the energy and focus we put into our efforts. Do you remember the "SuperBall"? A neat little rubber ball from the 1970's that REALLY reached amazing heights ... because of *The Bounce*.

I see IFYE in this same situation: a simple four-step process. Not easy, but simple. IFYE has been in phase one for quite a while and recognize that phase 2 is now. The leadership and efforts of the Reposition Committee are setting the stage for phases 3 & 4. Their efforts and enthusiasm, beginning in February 2011, are contagious to the Association Board. They have been exploring ways to reinvigorate IFYE, and the committee's report in this issue will share some of those results.

We have a ways to go, but we hope to have some exciting news for everyone as we approach the 2012 National IFYE Conference in Nebraska. As Martin Luther King, Jr. has said, "*Faith is the first step even when you don't see the whole staircase.*" Make your plans now to attend and have a direct voice in the future of IFYE. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank the board members who are completing their terms: Grace Elliot (Region A), Marian Huey (Region B), Art Deisher (Region C), and Kim Reaman (Region D). Their time, effort and progressiveness in moving this organization forward is greatly appreciated.

Incoming board members beginning their 3-year terms in 2012 include: Norma Wu (Region A), Stephen Mullen (Region B), Richard Wagner (Region C), and Art Tenbrink (Region D). Association Board officers in 2012 will be: President, Alan Lambert; Vice President, Richard Wagner; Secretary, John Wells; and Treasurer, Norma Wu.

Reposition Committee Activities

Since the last newsletter, your Reposition Committee has had 2 conference calls, a trip to see Russ Mawby and a trip to Washington, D.C. We have also developed a partnership agreement worksheet for use with potential partners and met with the current IFYE coordinators conducting programs in their states. It has been a busy time and there is a lot to report to you.

The conference calls were used to streamline the Association Goals for 2012 to only those goals that influence the potential partners. We removed all the internal Association goals such as "Recognition" to produce a more manageable document when talking with partners under consideration. The "What makes IFYE Unique" document and the goals were summarized on one page and sent to the potential partners we met with in Washington, D.C. so they would be ready to talk when we arrived.

The meeting with Russ Mawby, 1948 IFYE (MI to United Kingdom) and Chairman Emeritus W. K. Kellogg Foundation, was to inform him on IFYE, 4-H Council and 4-H Headquarters activities during the past year and to seek his guidance as we moved forward. Russ was supportive of the efforts already undertaken by the Association and the Reposition Committee. The meeting was very helpful and concluded with Russ supporting the Washington, D.C. trip the committee was making the following weekend. He offered a personal connection suggestion for us to meet with when we were at the Association of Public and Land Grant Universities (APLU) meeting.

The following points clarify the direction the Reposition Committee will take on behalf of the Association Board.

- 1. The IFYE Association should step-upto-the-plate and not worry about the past and find positive ways to get the alumni enthused and participating in an exchange program that stresses the roots of the successful program from the early years of IFYE.
- 2. National orientation and debriefing for exchangees is essential for the bonding of participants and their understanding of the importance of becoming an

active, supportive participant in the IFYE Alumni Association.

- 3. Getting back to the farm/rural demographics for host families and exchange delegates might go a long way in helping to manage the risk component in the program that is a concern.
- Potentially changing our name will 4. not change the fact that we work with 4-H alumni, but keeping IFYE will maintain world-wide recognition and identity.

Since our meetings, an anonymous IFYE alumni has volunteered to reimburse the 2012 conference registration of all those 2010 and 2011 returning IFYE exchangees who attend conference. This offer has been accepted by the Association Board and the eligible individuals will be contacted.

The Association President, Alan Lambert, has been in communication with the Washington, D.C. contacts that were established in our first trip last February. Alan set appointments for November and 8 with USDA/NIFA, Foreign Agricultural Services (FAS), APLU, the State Department, and USAID. Six of the ten Reposition Committee members met with these entities. The FAS, USDA/NIFA, and APLU have the most promise for our continued efforts. Alan will continue to communicate as needed with them.

But, the most exciting development in Washington, D.C. was the impromptu meeting that the committee representatives with American Farm Bureau had Federation (AFBF)! Committee member Barbara Spangler called the American Farm Bureau national office. She was connected with Margaret Wolff, Executive Director, Organization Department. She was an IFYE from Pennsylvania to Japan in 1990! Margaret (Margee) brought Dan Durheim, Executive Director, American FB Foundation for Agriculture into the meeting.

Both Margee and Dan were very interested in what we were offering and proposing. They explained the policy-making process that FB uses and suggested ways we can use that process and at the same time use the Young Farmers and Ranchers (YF&R)

organization to advance our progress. Using both methods simultaneously, they were thinking FB would be eager to expand their international footprint beyond the four exchanges they are currently sending and receiving from Germany through their McCloy program.

They suggested that our committee, or representatives of the IFYE Association, attend their upcoming conferences this winter. Dates and locations will be provided to us soon. They suggested a recent IFYE give a talk to the attendees. If getting on the program was not possible at this late date, they suggested we have a static display.

To explain the possibilities and excitement for the FB partnership would fill the rest of this newsletter. Suffice it to say, action is being taken to have an IFYE presence at the YF&R Convention in Grand Rapids, Michigan in February 2012.

As discussed at the IFYE conference in New England last June, IFYE is also working to have a presence at the National 4-H Collegiate Conference in Reno, Nevada in April 2012.

IFYE is on the move and we will likely start using MailChimp/ email updates to keep you informed in a more timely fashion. For those without email, we will continue to use the newsletter to keep you updated.



Do, Do Dues

Thank you to all of the IFYE alumni that have paid dues in 2011! Your participation and support is greatly appreciated.

In October, the IFYE Association reached a new recent-year record for number of members. For the fourth consecutive year, we have seen our annual membership numbers grow. We now have 254 members that have paid. The number continues to grow almost daily. This is good, but why is it important?

Annual dues provide the majority of the operational income for the Association. Interest from life members dues and operational donations provide the remaining needed revenue.

Twenty-five percent (25%) of the IFYE database are life members, paying an average of about \$150 each. (Current life memberships are \$300 for individuals and \$400 for couples). Even with 254 annual members, that is only about six percent (6%) of the possible annual members on the database. So, allowing for rounding, only 30% of the alumni are dues-paying members. Probably, only in baseball is a 30% achievement level considered a success! I cannot think of any other area where 30% is passing or acceptable! We have a lot of work yet to do.

As the Reposition Committee gets the IFYE Association prepared to be worthy of consideration by a national entity, **we need your help**. Eventually the Association, through the fundraising arm (the IFYE Foundation), is going to need to approach companies and grant organizations for funds. Participation through **membership needs to be at 47% or better** for funding success to be maximized. So, if you have not paid dues for 2011, please use the clip-out below.

Annual dues are requested each calendar year, unless you are a life member. Even though we are in the waning days of 2011, it is important you pay \$25 for this year. If you are financially able to send \$50, please do so and it will be credited for 2011 and 2012.

Again, the Association thanks those who have paid dues and encourages the rest of you to help us with your participation by paying \$25. Each one of you will be setting a record in IFYE membership growth!

There have been some changes in the Board of the IFYE Foundation. At the June conference in CT, three new members were elected to the Board, as three long-time members terms expired.

Retiring from the Board were Dick Tenney, Secretary, Mary Ottmar and Maurice Johnson. We thank these members for their dedication and devotion to the Foundation.

Coming on the Board are: Keith Ferris, Michigan; Andrea Maille, Pennsylvania; and Doug Pierson, New York. These new members are a great addition and I know they will provide new ideas and innovation in fundraising.

Also, Charles Larson requested to discontinue his service as an advisor to the Board. Maurice Johnson has agreed to provide his service as advisor.

The Foundation Board has supported international exchanges through grant requests at a level that is within its income. The contributions that come from IFYE's are pretty much the sole source of monies available. The operational cost of the Foundation is quite low, so it allows most of the income to support exchanges.

We are disappointed that the coin project is on hold and, in all probability, the Foundation wouldn't receive any benefit, even if it moves forward. A year ago, this looked like a windfall opportunity. Whatever will be will be.

The "reconnect" committee has been renamed to the "repositioning" committee

and there may be some progress in providing the over-19 exchange program. Meetings in early November in Washington DC will provide answers that both the Association and Foundation Boards are anxious to learn. Stay tuned.

If you haven't provided an e-mail address to either the Association or Foundation Boards, please do so. The fastest and least expensive way to communicate is through e-mail. Yes, we know not everyone has the capability.

Many in our country are experiencing difficult times. Whether they are out of work or the rise and fall of the markets has them hurting, we realize the situation can be hard. The Foundation is very dependent on your support and we thank you for all the past support you have provided. Everyone who has experienced a cultural exchange knows its value. It is hoped that the Foundation can continue to support these opportunities in the future.

Maybe we aren't committed to the \$1.2 million that the coin project would have required, but we do need to find corporations and trusts that are willing to give to the cause. We have a product to sell, cultural exchanges to a foreign country. Let's start our engines.

May this season of holidays provide you and your family all the joy and togetherness that anyone could want. If you are near a college or university that has foreign students, invite one or more to your home to experience an American family holiday.

2011 IFYE Orientation and Welcome Program Report

Summary of Report Prepared by Deryl Waldren (KS-Poland 1977)

The 2011 IFYE Orientation and Welcome Program was conducted at the Best Western Airport Inn and Conference Center, Wichita, Kansas. It began on Friday morning, June 17, 2011 with the arrival of inbound and outbound IFYEs and concluded after lunch on Monday, June 20, 2011.

The purpose of this program was to conduct a national orientation for both inbound IFYE participants and outbound IFYE participants at one location. One major goal of the orientation was to "provide the participants with the knowledge, skills, and aspirations to have a successful IFYE program while in the USA or abroad. Exchange programs provide opportunities for young adults to develop a "world view" including a global perspective and the skills and importance for living in a global society.

(MT to Germany/ Denmark). Sixteen inbounds were from Switzerland (3), Austria (1), Germany (3), Sweden (1), England (1), Scotland (2), Taiwan (3), N. Ireland (1), Finland (1).

Activities included: introduction activities (such as a series of name games), educational tours, workshops, country presentations, and a cultural simulation.

- Workshops centered around .
 - *Photography* a time to interactively learn more about photography and how to better use their camera, a PowerPoint lecture presentation, questions and answers, and with one-on-one assistance to learn about changing camera settings
 - Blogs and Media Tips allowed participants to learn how to set up their own personal blog to better capture their IFYE experiences while gone. The workshop was experiential in that the trainer showed how easy it is to set up a blog on the web using Internet connectivity in the hotel. Several IFYEs created their own blogs for their IFYE experience during the IFYE orientation and welcome program. The second part of the workshop included tips in working with the media while gone from home. Martha Denney, Director of International Education, Colorado State University, Fort Collins, CO was the speaker.
 - "Packing Your Cross-Cultural Survival Kit
 - Overview of 4-H Youth Development presented by Deryl Waldren

- "Life in the Land of Oz" a cultural simulation Jennifer Pfortmiller shared a hands-on experiential activity where the group was divided into two cultures, and the second group had to pick up on cues from the dominant culture. Not following the cultural norms caused participants to be kicked out of the culture. It was very realistic as to what participants may feel in another country when they don't speak the language well, and do not understand the culture at any level.
- Educational tours allowed participants a chance to get to know each other better in an informal setting while learning about the historical and current area. Tours included in this orientation were Cosmosphere and Salt Museum, as well as CowTown.

University of Wyoming 4-H Specialists, Kim Reaman (1984 IFYE Nebraska to Jamaica) and Warren Crawford received a grant from the United States Department State, Educational of and Cultural Affairs Office to administer American Youth the Leadership Program with Mongolia. The program is open to any youth, 15 to 17 years of age, who live in the western United States. The threeyear grant is designed to help youth grow into global citizens through a cultural exchange and explore the similarities

and differences in environmental issues which Mongolia and the western United States share.

The 4-week exchange is a partnership between Wyoming 4-H and the Mongolian 4-H Youth Organization. One of the unique aspects of the grant is that it includes the Mongolian host brothers and sisters, along with the American participants, in all of the activities for the duration of the program. Twenty-nine youth and five adults from the western United States participated in the program this year.

The first week of the exchange involved cultural training in Ulaanbaatar, the capital city of Mongolia. Ulaanbaatar has a population of over 1 million people and is known by Mongolians as simply U.B. Most of the American participants were from ranches, farms or small towns in the Western United States and our first lesson was how to cross the streets in U.B. Traffic, as in many

capital cities in developing countries, is chaotic with an abundance of cars and not enough traffic lanes or pedestrian cross walks. The Mongolians were good teachers - all American participants learned to traverse the streets safely!

Cultural training in U.B. included language training, English classes for the Mongolians and



Mongolian classes for the Americans, workshops highlighting cultural differences and similarities visits to historical and cultural sites and events around the city, team building activities and a community service project. Each American participant on the exchange, was asked to bring a children's book to donate to the Mongolian 4-H Youth Organization's reading project. In total, the American delegation donated 70 children's books to Mongolian 4-H. During the stay in U.B., an American participant commented on their surprise at how technologically connected the Mongolian teens were "they use all the same things we do, cell phones and Facebook".

Each American participant had an opportunity to live and learn with their host family. Since the Mongolian youth had been hanging out with the American participants in U.B., they already knew their host brother or sister and the transition to the two-week host family

stay was easily made. So many special things happened during the host family stays: birthdays were celebrated, we learned about Mongolian traditions, visited local herder families, toured coal and copper mines to learn about land reclamation and became part of our Mongolian families lives. One of the American participants shared "*I can't believe how quickly I was accepted into the family. I have a little sister (4 years old) there and she loves me.*"

The entire group gathered together for the final week in a tourist Ger camp. Here we learned how to make traditional dairy products, construct a *ger*, attended *Naadam* festivities, and spent many hours hiking in the beautiful mountain terrain. We also organized our own Ger camp *Naadam* competitions. The opening ceremony included singing the American and Mongolian national anthems followed by a fashion show for participants to show off their Mongolian *deels*, a traditional Mongolian dress.

Throughout the exchange, focus group discussions were conducted with the American youth participants to process their experience, discuss issues they might be dealing with and to garner what was being learned. One of the groups summarized "[We] view our similarities as being much more extensive than expected. Other than not sharing a language, [there are] many overlaps: similar humor, games, music, troubles (family alcoholism, environment, etc.)"

A powerful closing ceremony wrapped the experience up for

everyone. The breadth of the program was captured in a slide show which highlighted photos taken throughout the program and many stories were shared for the first time or retold at the bonfire. As with any program that touches so many hearts, it was difficult to say good bye. The memories will be cherished forever by the American and Mongolian participants.

2011 European IFYE Conference

23-30 July 2011 Metsäkartano Resort, Finland Crystal Yonker

Upon arrival at the secluded Metsäkartano Nature Tourist Centre, imagine our surprise when real Finnish military border guards checked our IFYE visas. Some of us did not have "proper documentation" and were taken to the army tents to be interrogated! Before the evening meal, those detained were escorted to headquarters and released to IFYEland authorities.

Following the formal opening of the 53rd European Conference on Sunday morning (with 130 delegates from 17 nations), the Empress of IFYEland, Sirkku Laurila, married her fiancé, Juha Orava. Only the bride, groom, and minister knew of the wedding plan! The reception followed with champagne and delicious traditional Finnish wedding cake.

The skilled, talented, and strong children and teenagers from the Royal Circus of IFYEland entertained us in the afternoon. Next, IFYEs went to circus school to learn (try to learn!) skills to do what they had just seen ... including acrobatics, riding a unicycle, high/tight wire walking, juggling, magic, and spinning plates on a stick. That evening, at dinner, the Empress decreed "Circus" with creative costumes and delegates providing the entertainment.

Each evening, everyone looked forward to the IFYEland News Report "TV broadcast", followed by traditional Finnish entertainment ... as well as American DJ (Andrew King) providing music for dancing.

Winter IFYElympic tribe competitions were held at Vuokatti, a sports complex with a 2 mile long cold (-5° C) tunnel used for winter sports training. Tribes competed in cross country skiing, snowshoeing, and kick sledge relay events.

Before breakfast, each delegate chose a pair of hand-knitted wool socks from the clothesline – part of the 150 pair knitted

by IFYEs, their relatives and friend all over Finland. These prized socks were worn at the after-ski sock hop that evening.

Summer IFYElympic competitions (held at Metsäkartano the following morning) included beach games, a type of shuffleboard, archery, quilt designing and sewing, and "sort of" formula 1 (pedaling a car around the course in exactly 40 seconds *slowly* - which was not an easy task for competitive personalities!

Academic classes acquainted delegates with Finland's geography, history, peoples, cultures, religions, languages, industries, and humor. Sewing (an international language) was "spoken" in the piecing of 40+ quilts (40-50 cm) that were made to be given to newborns at a Kuopio hospital designed by the tribes. The John Deere fabric from the USA was very popular.

Tours were offered to: the Koli nature area, a fertilizer factory, a brewery museum, an 1880's traditional "slash and burn" farm, and a dog sled business including 75 dogs. One tour was to a nursery owned by a Finnish IFYE to Idaho and Vermont whose specialty is growing certified strawberry "mother" plants, as well as several varieties of strawberries, and berries that are a specialty of Finland.

Although Midsummer occurred more than a month prior to the conference, we were treated to a Midsummer party where we enjoyed swimming, dinner, a sing-along, and a bonfire on the beach. The traditional Midsummer menu included: baked salmon, special potato salad, Karelian pies, and delicious Finnish crepes. If one's tummy still had room, roasting a sausage on a stick was in order. There was no lack of food, good companionship, or entertainment.

The last day of the conference was called "Well Being and Well Doing" consisting of activities that were less demanding and more relaxing. Included were: morning yoga on the beach, sauna (pronounced *sow-na*), peat sauna, fishing, berry picking, swimming, and boating.

The Empress' Gala Farewell Dinner was a gournet feast with an entrée of roast elk with coffee gravy and dessert of cloudberry parfait with chocolate cloudberry sauce. It was a wonderful evening with delicious food and interesting conversation with new and old friends.

The next morning, with hugs and "See you in Sweden in 2012", sleepy delegates boarded the IFYEland Express on the first leg of their trips home. The distant railway station in Siilinjärvi and airport in Kuopio gave passengers time to reminisce about their marvelous and amazing week in Finland.

Dr. Lois Englberger (MO India 1970), nutritionist and public health advocate, was widely known in nutrition circles for promoting the value of healthy local foods for people's cultures, health, environments, economies and food security. Her academic accomplishments/activities included activities for decreasing vitamin A deficiency in children. (See "In Memoriam" page 12.)

Over 1000 varietes of bananas exist in the world today - many local to a geographic area. The work of Dr. Lois Englberger with this fruit surpasses many accomplishments in locating sources of Vitamin A and promoting this and other local foods - as in the case of the people of the Federated States of Micronesia (FSM).
