Register Now for 2001's IFYE Odyssey

An IFYE Odyssey begins in Burlington, Vermont, at noon on Thursday, June 28, and ends Sunday afternoon, July 1. It's the 45th National IFYE Conference being hosted by New England alumni. Conference headquarters will be the Sheraton Hotel, located off I-89 and near the Burlington airport and the Essex Junction Amtrak station.

The Conference will open with a luncheon on Thursday, followed by regional meetings and the official Conference photo. The evening will include A Taste of New England dinner, a culinary odyssey featuring food from the six New England states, the W'Abenaki Dancers and a Country Auction fundraiser to support the IFYE Association website (www.ifyeusa.org). Details will be included with your registration confirmation.

Friday will feature five all-day personal odyssey options and a chicken barbecue dinner and wine tasting on the grounds of the Shelburne Museum. Odyssey options include:

Quilting—A workshop and visit to the renowned

Shelburne Museum, then featuring a special quilt show. (The museum will not be open that evening)

- ★ Antiques—A workshop with Mr. Antique, George Michael, former host of the PBS series Antiques & Americana, and visits to local antique shops.
- ★ Forestry/Maple Sugaring-A workshop on forestry in New England, with visits to the Proctor Maple Research Center and Westford Woods, a sawmill and tree farm.
- **Historical**—Visits to the Ethan Allen Homestead and the Lake Champlain Maritime Museum.
- **Agriculture**—Visits to the University of Vermont's Dairy/Equine Complex, Cabot Cheese Dairy, a local farm, and the Home of Moo Doo organic fertilizer.

It will be an IFYE Odyssey on Saturday with the morning annual Association meeting, followed by the IFYE Association awards luncheon. Afternoon workshops will feature the IFYE Foundation and Planned Giving, Operation of the IFYE exchange program; Heifer Project and developing countries; the Global Education

Envisioning the Future of IFYE

What is the future of the IFYE program? How do we continue to expand and improve upon 53 years of success? I believe the answer lies in what Stephen Covey said about visionary leadership. We must maintain ties to our past, which have been our strengths, yet be willing to face changes. We are not living in "status quo" times in the world of IFYE and the Cooperative Extension system's 4-H program. The IFYE program experienced huge changes in the 1990s, and this will continue during the next decade.

The biggest challenge I see in the next 10 years is to maintain an adequate pool of IFYE applicants. We all know the value of cross-cultural and global exchange programs. We all know the value of getting to know a culture by living with host families. Most of us don't worry about comparing the IFYE experience to being a tourist for three weeks. We should! We understand the value of IFYE, but most young adults do not. Unless we find better ways to draw 15- to 30-year-olds into the IFYE program, the program won't continue long-term. We must find ways to show the value of cross-cultural exchange programs versus short travel junkets around the world. I think the result will be a combination of both.

Once an IFYE, always an IFYE, and most of us have had other international experiences along the way. The mindset that a young adult will have one significant international experience is passe. Most young adults today will have multiple international experiences in their professional and personal lives, but they will be of a month's duration or less. Fewer young adults will experience our traditional 3-6 month IFYE exchange. Our challenge will be to convince young adults they have the time, money and desire to experience the IFYE program in the way we know and love.

Alvin Toffler wrote, "If we do not learn from history, we shall be compelled to relive it. If we do not change the future, we shall be compelled to endure it. And that could be worse." We have the power, ability and creativity to shape the vision for the future of IFYE. Whether or not we choose to do so is up to you individually and all of us collectively as an IFYE Association. ★

4-H International Exchanges—The Need and Meaning

We now embark on, or are one year into the new millennium...depending on how you view it! We are definitely into 4-H International's second half-century. The question is...what does that second half the next 50 years—mean for IFYE and other 4-H International programs?

Let me introduce you to Gloria Gonzales of Mexico. She was an exchange student 28 years ago and lived with the Cleon and Dema Krill family in Edgerton, Ohio. She has been back many times. The families traveled in both directions for family weddings and visits. Several years after, her son, and later a nephew, had similar experiences and lived with the Krills' daughter and son-in-law, Beverly and John Emch in Archbold, Ohio. The Krills also hosted several IFYE exchangees, and their daughter Jane (my daughter-in-law) was an IFYE to Israel/Netherlands, 1986/1988. Jane and my son, Dean, Egypt/

Israel 1986, met during the program in Israel.

A sad occasion gave me the opportunity to meet Gloria, Alejandro, and Jaime early in January. They had come for the funeral of the Emchs' 21-yearold son, Joe, a junior at Ohio State University, who died suddenly of a brain hemorrhage. My visits with Gloria provided a beautiful story of what can happen when an international exchange takes place, the families become as one, and a cross-cultural family-wide lifetime friendship blossoms and grows. This is what IFYE and 4-H International, and other exchange programs hopefully are all about.

The poem accompanying this editorial was written by Joe Emch during his high school years. It was read during his memorial service and imprinted on the memorial program. It's a tribute to him and a challenge to each of us as we "play our role in the forest of life!" We know continuation and success of 4-H International programs is going to depend on the commitment of the IFYE Association and the Extension Service, and on the ability of the IFYE Foundation and Extension Service to raise the necessary funds. Our Association president, in his column above, speaks to the future.

The report about Campaign 2000 on page 6 points out the challenge to raise the necessary funds in support of 2002 and future programs. Your support of Campaign 2000 is crucial for the future of IFYE and the entire arena of 4-H International programs.

The IFYE Association also needs your membership support. We are now into a new membership year. Deadline Nears for Award, Mini-Grant Applications

The IFYE Association Recognition Award nominations and 4-H World Understanding Mini-Grant proposals are due April 15, 2001—not in March as indicated in the last issue. All recipients will be announced at the Awards Luncheon June 30 during the National IFYE Conference in Vermont.

The Recognition Awards are for outstanding contributions and leadership related to international development, education, exchanges, and understanding. There are four categories: Friend of 4-H International, Commendation for Contributions to International Understanding, Meritorious Service to 4-H International Programs by Extension Personnel, and Outstanding Contributions by 4-H International Exchange Alumni to 4-H International Programs.

The 4-H World Understanding Mini-Grants provide an opportunity to develop and demonstrate interest in international understanding amongst youth in local communities. Grants of \$50 to \$200 are made in two categories: to fund projects in the US that deal with intercultural activities and/or projects, and to fund projects in countries that have participated or are currently involved in IFYE exchange programs.

Foundation. "Mawby's valuable experience as a major foundation official and an advocate for IFYE will be of great counsel to the Foundation," stated Dreyer. One of the pioneer IFYE delegates, Russ is chairman emeritus and an honorary trustee of the W.K. Kellogg Foundation. He served as the Foundation's chief executive officer for 25 years. He was a 4-H member volunteer leader and Extension staff member and was

as the Foundation's chief executive officer for 25 years. He was a 4-H member, volunteer leader and Extension staff member, and was Michigan's assistant director of Extension in charge of 4-H prior to joining the Kellogg Foundation staff in 1965. Speaking at the National IFYE Conference in 1956, Mawby's

Speaking at the National IFYE Conference in 1956, Mawby's challenge to alumni continues as a challenge today. He noted that participation in IFYE is in three phases: the experience overseas, reporting back, and the alumni role. Recognizing IFYE's progress at that time in the first two, he challenged, "...the great potential for the future lies in the development and utilization of the talents and enthusiasm of our alumni." Pointing out that the need was to integrate the basic philosophy of IFYE into the 4-H program, he emphasized that "the leadership can come from us. We have the experience, the training, and the enthusiasm to do this if we will."

Historical Perspective on 4-H International

Excellence! The Extension Service strives for it in all 4-H programs. And it must be acknowledged—an Image of Excellence includes an international dimension!

An international dimension adds a unique focus to any program and helps us better understand our world and the global society in which we live. 4-H has an enviable history of international involvement on which to build in the future. 4-H International programs stimulate a growing international emphasis within the US 4-H program and serve as a link with similar youth organizations around the world.

Over 60 years ago, 4-H recognized the potential of youth in promoting international understanding and development, even before World War II began. In 1946, four former 4-H members from New York State promoted the exchange idea with their state 4-H leader and the national 4-H staff. The result: the first International Farm Youth Exchange (IFYE) program in 1948. The name was officially changed to International Four-H Youth Exchange in 1974.

The first exchange participants—17 Americans and six Europeans—like the thousands after them, lived and worked with host families and became part of the activities in the communities in which they lived. This family/communitycentered experience has always been the basis of 4-H International exchanges.

In 1948, the Extension Committee on Organization and Policy (ECOP) stated that the program was to be more than just an exchange and approved a plan of action which provided:

 Direct 4-H relief activities in western Europe, including CARE packages and other assistance.

- A clearinghouse of information for the exchange
- of correspondence and information.
- ★ A direct exchange of young persons.

As a kick-off relief effort, delegates from 38 states brought food parcels to the 1948 National 4-H Camp (now Conference) for distribution in the United Kingdom.

The need for a formal structure to support and promote 4-H International programs led, in part, to the establishment in 1948 of the National 4-H Club Foundation, one of the two predecessor organizations of National 4-H Council. Council discontinued coordination of 4-H International programs in1991. The IFYE Association of the USA has administered the IFYE program since the early 90s through an agreement with the Families, 4-H and Nutrition unit of USDA. Program management is through a contract with CD International Program Services of Phoenix, Arizona.

Over 5,000 young Americans from 49 states and over 4,000 from the 106 participating countries have participated in the IFYE program since its beginning in 1948. IFYE was expanded after a decade to include opportunities for 4-H age young people. In 1972, a special exchange with Japan began, which currently involves the US 4-H program and three organizations in Japan. Many programs have been undertaken by individual states, from international education and exchange programs to consulting work in countries developing programs similar to 4-H. Several countries around the world now have programs similar to 4-H-many of them organized and/or enhanced as a

result of 4-H International programs.

Other exchange and training programs were developed as a result of IFYE. 4-H International delegates have assisted with youth programs in other countries through 4-H Peace Corps projects and the 4-H International Youth Development Project (YDP). Other programs include the International Agricultural Training Program (ATP), the Professional Rural Youth Leader Exchange (PRYLE), International Extension 4-H Travel Seminars, the International Agricultural Work Experience (AWE), the Young Agricultural Specialists Exchange Program (YASEP), and various special programs. Participation in all programs now totals over 35,000.

The 4-H International experience has not been limited to exchange participants. Programs have affected the lives and attitudes of thousands more, including the essential host families. Cross-cultural exchanges provide major support of Extension's mission related to youth exchanges and international awareness.

The words "and my world" were added to the 4-H pledge in

1973. This was the first time the pledge had been officially changed, although the action was mainly a recognition of what many states had already implemented.

International relationships are vital to understanding, friendship and peace. 4-H International programs are an important part. They have created, and will continue to create, valued partnerships which enhance global cooperation and cultural understanding, and contribute to the international mission of 4-H and the entire Cooperative Extension System. Contributors to the challenge include the IFYE Association of the USA, the IFYE Foundation of the USA, the National Association of Extension 4-H Agents (NAE4-HA), the National 4-H Youth Development Global Education Design Team, and Extension staff at the county, state and national levels.
