## Membership, Contribution Totals Lagging

Future of exchange programs depends on financial support—do your part today!

Spring brings new life and renewed commitment they say! Hopefully it will do so for Campaign 2000 contributions and for IFYE Association memberships. Both are lagging...a cause for concern as to the future of the IFYE Association and for the future of

the IFYE program itself.

Your membership and campaign support is encouraged and the need is urgent. It will help ensure that both the IFYE Association and the IFYE exchange can go forward.

The IFYE Association needs a minimum of \$50,000 annually

just to keep the IFYE program at a reasonable cost and at current levels of participation. Campaign 2000 has produced less than \$18,000 at this time.

At the end of March, the IFYE Foundation had received only 209 contributions to Campaign 2000. That's about 4% of all US IFYE alumni and less than 2% of all US participants in 4-H International exchange programs. Campaign 2000 provides an opportunity for IFYE and other 4-H International alumni to express appreciation for their own memorable opportunity through financial support to future programs.

The IFYE Association has received only 39 annual memberships for 2001. When added to the 1,084 life members, current total membership is only about 20% of all US IFYE alumni and 10% of all US

participants in 4-H International exchange programs. The goal is 2001 memberships in 2001!

and friends of 4-H International
are encouraged and urged to
contribute either annual or life
membership dues, which in turn,

The IFYE Association is committed to all 4-H
International programs and specifically to IFYE, the program it administers through an agreement with the Extension Service. Your membership and support is essential to the fulfillment of this commitment!

## New England Ready to Host "An IFYE Odyssey"

## **Connecting to Our IFYE Future**

In the mid-90s the IFYE Association reworked its vision and mission statements and worked hard to revitalize the IFYE program. Norm Bauer, in remarks last June at the National IFYE Conference in Illinois, said, "If we are to have an IFYE program tomorrow, we have to have a vision and 'Connect to the Future.' Where do we want the

IFYE program to be in 10 or 20 years? What are our goals? Are we prepared to make changes to the program?"

Stan Dreyer, president of the IFYE Foundation, has written, "While the IFYE Association has a vision and mission for itself, it appears that the exchange program does not." As we have noted, the program in 2001 seems to be struggling to maintain an adequate pool of applicants even with costs being lowered through contributions. Is IFYE as it is today fitting in with the Extension's international programs agenda? Stan observes that "corporate sponsors are interested in funding programs where the experience is relevant to their

interests, and international

leadership development experiences and measurable outcomes are important for gaining such financial support."

Our world has changed. IFYE must change. I propose that we initiate a new visioning process with these key components:

- ★ It should be very focused on evaluating current circumstances and maximizing the value of IFYE in the future.
- ★ Involve all concerned, including a cross-section of alumni by decades of participation; recent alumni aware of issues new applicants consider; program manager; Extension/4-H and USDA staff, host families, potential donors, others(?).

- ★ Led by a professional facilitator familiar with the IFYE program.
- ★ Participants committed to full-time participation in the process.
- ★ A process in itself, not part of another Conference or event.

I hope we can convene such a process by next spring. I hope a comprehensive report would be available for presentation at the 2002 National IFYE Conference.

Key to any success for a new vision would be an endorsement of this concept at the upcoming Conference. Join me in moving towards "Connecting to our IFYE Future!" I welcome your comments and suggestions.

## **Peace Corps Celebrates 40th Anniversary**

#### NATIONAL CONFERENCE TO INCLUDE 4-H RECEPTION

Forty years ago last October, President John F. Kennedy challenged Americans "to live in another country for two years to help people help themselves, to have them get to know us as Americans; and for us to bring the world back home." Since then 161,000 Americans have accepted the challenge and served in 134 countries, speaking 300+ languages.

A yearlong Peace Corps 40th anniversary celebration is now underway. The highlight will be a national conference in Washington, DC, September 20-23, 2001, celebrating "four decades and 300,000 years of volunteer service."

Caroline Kennedy, daughter

of President Kennedy, is serving as honorary chair. "We can think of no more fitting tribute to 40 years of Peace Corps than to have John Kennedy's daughter lead us in celebration," said K. Richard Pyle, chairman of the National Peace Corps Association (NPCA) board of directors.

The conference will include an array of seminars and workshops, country of service updates, receptions, a career workshop, Capitol Hill and Embassy visits, a march across Memorial Bridge with country flags, and a recommitment and memorial service at Arlington Cemetery. A reception for 4-Hers who served is planned during the conference. The finale will be a Gala Celebration at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts honoring President Kennedy and Sargent Shriver, the first Peace Corps Director.

4-H was involved in Peace
Corps from the very beginning.
Grant Shrum, Director of the
National 4-H Foundation (now
Council) testified before
Congress in favor of the Peace
Corps and shared the experience
of the first 12 years of IFYE.
John Banning, Assistant
Director, Extension 4-H
Division, USDA, served on the
Peace Corps Advisory
Committee in its earliest years.
Shortly after President Kennedy
signed the Peace Corps bill into

law, 4-H got directly involved. Young adults from around the country with 4-H experience joined, many of them to participate in Peace Corps programs contracted to National 4-H Foundation. Several IFYE alumni drew on their crosscultural experience and interest, joined the Peace Corps and served throughout the world. The first 4-H Peace Corps project was to Brazil in 1962 to work with the 4-S programseven of the 43 volunteers were IFYE Alumni, W. Francis

Pressly, NC-Italy 1951, was the 4-H Foundation's Overseas Representative supervising the project. Pressly returned to the US in 1964 to become National 4-H Council's director of 4-H International Programs.

Other 4-H Peace Corps programs sent volunteers to work with 4-H-type organizations in El Salvador, Malaysia, Sarawak, Uruguay and Venezuela. Richard R. Angus, MN-Italy 1956, was the Overseas Representative in Uruguay. Ronald C. Faas, IA-Brazil 1963 was the Overseas Representative in Brazil following Pressly.

The National Peace Corps Association is sponsoring the conference. #### **Opportunities with Poland 4-H**

"It is not our task to make youth into happier kids. Our task is to assist youth in developing skills that would enable them to become more successful adults." This statement is from the Poland 4-H mission statement. It goes on to say that Poland 4-H strives to help youth become self-directed, productive and contributing members of a democratic society.

US volunteers can be part of the action. Here's a great opportunity for students, 4-H leaders, 4-H International alumni, Extension staff, teachers, retirees and others.

Plans are underway for 20 volunteers to spend July in Poland working with the Polish 4-H program. The US volunteers will teach English to rural youth and help with 4-H environmental projects that the language groups will participate in.

Local governments will provide in-country travel. Host families will provide room and board. Weekends will be free. Volunteers will be responsible for their round-trip travel to Warsaw, and weekend and personal expenses.

4-H was first introduced to Poland in the 1920s. That effort turned into an adult training program. It wasn't until 1991 that the first 4-H club for youth was organized in Leszno Province as a result of a new Polish-American Extension Project.

The Fundacja Edukacyjna
4-H w Polsce (Polish 4-H
Foundation) was established in
1993 with the help of the
Michigan 4-H Foundation.
Fundacja Edukacyjna 4-H helps
with both fundraising and
programs, including international
exchanges with Estonia,
Hungary and the US.

## **Botswana 4B Celebrates 33rd Anniversary**

The Republic of Botswana, formerly the British protectorate of Bechuanaland, is a landlocked country in southern Africa surrounded by Namibia, South Africa, Zambia and Zimbabwe. Botswana and the 4B program share a unique beginning; the country gained independence in 1966 and the 4B program idea was born in 1966.

Botswana is a unique and fascinating country made up of eight main tribal groups:
Bamangwato, Bakwena,
Batawana, Bangwaketse,
Bakgatla, Bamalete, Barolong, and Batlokwa. Most speak
Setswana. English is the official language. (A language lesson:
Botswana-the country;
Motswana-one person;
Batswana-two or more people;
Setswana-the language.)

Botswana is justifiably proud of its 4B youth program. 4B celebrated its 33rd anniversary in 2000. Observances took place around the country with a major nationwide celebration in Shakawe in the northwest corner of the country.

It is one of the many countries around the world with a program similar to 4-H. It is also one where the US 4-H program and 4-H International Youth Development Project (YDP) participants played a key role in the development of 4B

from its very beginning.

The seeds of the 4B program had already been sown when Botswana gained independence

on September 30, 1966. Two young Batswana, one of whom would later be elected to the national assembly and then become the Minister of Agriculture, were in the US at the time as IFYE exchangees. And preparations were underway for the first US YDP delegate, Lyle Murphy of Michigan, to go to Botswana the next year.

Though it would be two years before the 4B program was officially founded in January 1968, the first 4B club was organized in 1967 in the village of Mookane with Mrs. P.J. Ramaloko, a local teacher, as the volunteer 4B leader.

It all started as a result of a visit to the US in 1965 by R.D. Molefe, then the Deputy Minister of Agriculture. His visit was made possible by a grant from the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs of the US Department of State. The Department of State and the US Information Agency provided considerable support for 4-H International exchange and training programs around the world between the 1950s and late 1980s.

4B has grown from a program of 12 clubs and 500 members in 1968 to 512 clubs with 21,584 members and 2,059 volunteer leaders in 2001. The program is made up of both community and school clubs.

The 4B symbol is a white four-leaf clover with a zebra in the center and a "B" in each leaf

for Boitschwaro (better citizen), Bonatla (hard worker), Boikanyo (trustworthy), and Botswana.

Agrippah Nehemiah, the current National 4B Leader, writes that the current emphasis of the program is vegetable production, poultry, beekeeping and woodlot development. A major concern is one known around the worldthe migration of rural youth to urban centers. Though the majority of clubs are schoolcentered, they are emphasizing village-based clubs for more continuity. The Assistant National 4B Leader is Widgence Kgoboki, who visited the US in 1979 on the Professional Rural Youth Leader Exchange.

4B has experienced good government program support over the years, a key to its success. It is unfortunate that financial support is limited at this time due to the need for increased funding to combat HIV/AIDS, a major epidemic in Botswana and that area of the world.

The National 4B Foundation, a private entity, was founded in 1982 to seek funds on behalf of 4B from non-governmental organizations and private donors. This is fortunate for 4B with its current special need for financial support. Daniel Malongwa, a strong supporter of 4B, is president of the 4B Foundation.

Twenty-six 4-H International YDP "4B Advisors" served in Botswana between 1967 and 1989. In addition several IFYE Ambassador and IFYE Representative delegates have visited Botswana since the mid-1980s. International Extension 4-H Travel Seminar groups visited Botswana in 1971 and 1976.

Over 40 Batswana exchangees have visited the US on the Professional Rural Youth Leader Exchange (PRYLE) and the IFYE Ambassador and IFYE Representative programs. These included Daniel K. Kwelagobe, who later became Minister of Agriculture; Moses M. Pholoba, the first National 4B Leader; and

Alphonse M. Nsala, National 4B Leader, 1978-1998.

The most recent Batswana to visit the US were IFYE exchangees Kelebileone Tirelo and Pelontle M.J. Scabe in 1999. Both work with the 4B program so they were anxious to learn about 4-H and thrilled to be able to attend the National Association of Extension 4-H Agents Conference in Pittsburgh. They were very impressed with the organization of the conference and the many seminars available to the conferees.

4B is playing a vital role in the development of Botswana and its young people. We salute 4B and Botswana and extend congratulations on the occasion of their 33rd anniversary!

## **Students Collect Paper Clips for Memorial**

Eighth-graders and their teachers in the Whitwell,
Tennessee, Middle School are involved in a fascinating class project—developing a Holocaust Memorial using paper clips, 6 million paper clips representing the 6 million Jews killed in the Holocaust. Though not a 4-H activity, all the students are 4-H members in this small Tennessee Valley town just west of the

January 1-December 31, 2000

Smoky Mountains and only 100 miles from where the Ku Klux Klan was founded.

The fact that Whitwell, a town of 1,600, has 425 middle school students, including six blacks, one Hispanic, no Asians, no Catholics, and no Jews, makes this a remarkable project.

It started in 1998 when the deputy principal and football coach, David Smith, attended a

training course in Chattanooga that included a seminar on the Holocaust. He was moved. The idea of including an after school course on the Holocaust caught on with the administration, parents and students.

The students were overwhelmed with the number of dead. Sandra Roberts, the English and social sciences teacher, taught the course and started by reading aloud, *The Diary of Anne Frank*. She explained that there were good people in Europe who stood up for the Jews, and that when the Nazis invaded Norway, many Norwegians expressed solidarity with their Jewish fellow citizens by pinning ordinary paper clips to their lapels.

At that point, the idea of the paper clip project was born. One of the students suggested they remember the victims by "collecting 6 million paper clips and turn them into a sculpture."

Whitwell eighth-graders went to Washington in March last year to visit the Holocaust Museum. They went home carrying 24,000 paper clips collected by project supporters. Security at the airport had trouble understanding why a bunch of teenagers and their teachers were transporting boxes and boxes of paper clips to Tennessee.

Paper clips and letters from around the US and the world continue to pour in. So many clips were sent in memory of specific Holocaust victims that the students decided they could not melt them down for a sculpture; the idea of "putting them into fire" now seemed inconceivable and wrong. Instead, they are seeking an authentic German railroad car from the 1940s, one they hope that may have actually transported victims to camps. It will serve as a museum with an area in the center for visitors,

with each end filled with paper clips representing the 6 million Holocaust victims.

In Whitwell, a paper clip will never again be just a paper clip. On April 30, the count was 4,098,144 paper clips, more than two-thirds of their goal.

## **IFYE Foundation to Quantify Impact of IFYE**

(First of a series. Future articles will focus on the impact of the IFYE experience.)

From 1967 through 1969 I completed two studies on the impact of the IFYE experience on the lives of the US delegates who participated in the program. As a member of the IFYE Foundation Board of Directors—which is attempting to quantify the impact of IFYE—I was asked to look again at the results.

In 1967 I wrote, "The inefficiency of communication and understanding among the peoples of the world today does much to create, as well as to continue, the tension and dissension among the people and their countries. Various types of exchange programs have been established to improve communication and understanding."

In spite of the technical advances in communications—most notably the World Wide Web or Internet—it doesn't seem that enough has changed in the last 50 years. There are still too many armed conflicts, human rights abuses and hungry children in the world today.

However, before we examine the influence of the IFYE exchange program we need to go back some 50 years.

**Our Beginnings** 

During World War II many boys and girls had become very close to the struggle as their 4-H clubs planted "Victory Gardens," preserved food and wrote to soldiers overseas. When the war was over the discussion topic at many 4-H meetings was, "What can we do to make sure that this doesn't happen again?" 4-H clubs sent supplies to war-torn countries to help people recover. Still these activities did not provide for a personal contact with people in other countries.

They wanted to really know the people.

In 1946 four Cornell University students, former 4-H members, shared with their state 4-H leader the idea that 4-H type programs would be enjoyed by youth in other countries and that understanding was a key to peace. He agreed and helped arrange for them to talk with officials in Washington, DC.

In 1947 four Germans who wanted to study 4-H so that they might have a similar program in their country attended the National 4-H Conference. The 4-H youth were surprised to find them friendly and agreed that more people in the US should have a chance to know such

A farm boy from Iowa had attended a citizenship camp in New York City in 1946, then went to Washington, DC to see some of the machinery of government. The Iowa youth visited the British Embassy, talked with the Ambassador about farm life in the US and invited him to visit. During his visit the Ambassador attended church with the family, helped with farm chores and attended a 4-H meeting. He was so impressed with the experience that upon his return to England he arranged for six Young Farmers to come to the US in 1947 to live with 4-H and FFA members.

From these beginnings the IFYE program began as a twoway program in 1948, with 17 US youth going to seven Western European countries and six Europeans coming to the US. \*
