Reflecting and Planning for the Future 4-H International Exchange Programs

Though Michigan hasn't been home for almost 40 years, Michigan is still "Home!" My children and grandchildren find that difficult to understand. And I understand! I'll always be proud to be a Michigan IFYE Alum and a member of the Michigan 4-H International Association, the first to be so named in the 1950s recognizing all 4-H International education and exchange programs!



4-H International Programs are an important and vital part of the 4-H program. However, the coordination of exchange programs has changed. As we have shared over the past two years, 4-H International programs are no longer administered at the national level. All programs are authorized and coordinated at the state level, even if they are supported with help from another agency or organization. This has again been emphasized by ECOP (Extension Committee on Organization and Policy) at their meeting in October.

The Extension Service/4-H in each state determines which programs they will coordinate and/or participate in and assumes full responsibility, explains National 4-H Headquarters, Extension Service, USDA.

The IFYE Association and the IFYE Foundation are not authorized to conduct programs, and doing so could jeopardize any authorization they are granted for use of the 4-H and 4-H International program names and logos. Involvement at the local, county and state level has always been one of the major goals of 4-H International programs. Alumni have not always been involved and provided the impact on 4-H that Extension expected. That opportunity is now more important and a worthy challenge! (These four paragraphs were prepared in consultation with National 4-H Headquarters).

The 44th National IFYE Conference was a week to remember! The IGADs maneuvered a coup and were cheered on by all - including the ISLYs, 1956 participants celebrated their 50th anniversary, conferees were held spellbound by speakers Robert Sakata and Aron Ralston, the conference service project resulted in nearly \$15,000, and it snowed on Pikes Peak!

Everyone experienced a hospitable air conditioned! Sheraton, enjoyed dinner and entertainment at the Flying W Ranch, joined one of the conference tours, and dressed in their finest for the closing banquet and festivities.

Robert "Bob" Sakata, president of Sakata Farms in Brighton, Colorado, keynoted the opening session with stories of his experiences of "turning adversity into opportunity." His family was among the Japanese Americans to be evacuated from the West Coast at the beginning of World War II. At 14 years of age, he was sent to a relocation camp in Topaz, Utah.

Due to his father's friendship with a Colorado State University (CSU) agricultural professor, it helped him secure an early release in December 1942 through a citizenship endorsement program. He relocated to Brighton in 1946 where he started a vegetable farm. His 40 acres at the time has grown into a 3,200 acre family vegetable farming operation.

Sakata serves on many local, state and national boards, including the Agriculture Science Council of CSU and the National Advisory Councils on Agriculture Research and Migrant Health.

Mr. Sakata ended his presentation by reading the Japanese American Creed (see page 5) and referring to one of his favorite Bible verses, Proverbs 29:18 (KJV), "Where there is no vision, people perish."

A Coup at an IFYE Conference? That's right! Just as the Friday evening dinner program was to begin, fifty-seven mid-20th-century women and self-initiated members of IGAD, the IFYE Guild of Ancient Dames, stole the show. Dressed for that period, they burst into their theme song (left) to the tune of "There is Nothin' Like a Dame!" Was it a response to the IFYE Society of Ladies Young (ISLY), organized in 2004? No question! However, without question, the ISLYs and all in attendance loved it!

A Colorado 4-H alum, Aron Ralston was the final speaker of the conference. He vividly related his experience of "turning adversity into opportunity" through his personal description of being pinned against a canyon wall by a tumbling 800-pound boulder. Six days later he amputated his own hand and wrist to gain his freedom and begin the trek to his truck eight miles away...and months of recovery. About a mile short of reaching his truck, a rescue helicopter spotted him and landed. Not knowing they were looking for him, he should over the sound of the chopper, "Can I get a lift?"

A native of the Midwest, Ralston retired from a career as a mechanical engineer at age twenty-six and relocated to Aspen, Colorado. Since his accident in April 2003, he has completed his unprecedented project to climb the fifty-nine Colorado peaks of more than 14,000 feet, alone, in winter.

A New York Times Bestseller, his book, "Between a Rock and a Hard Place," is hailed as a riveting adventure story. From the back cover: "The story that touched America's heart - from the man who lived to tell...An honest, inspiring, unexpectedly funny, and downright astonishing report from the line where death meets life..." A book worth the read! It is available at most bookstores and Amazon.com. He donated the proceeds from the sale of his book during the conference to the service project.

Ralston and conference co-chair Laura A. Schick, were members of the same 4-H Club in Colorado. Futures for Children - beneficiary of the conference service project, is committed to ensuring access to quality education for Native American students by matching children to mentors for one-on-one encouragement.

Although some individuals may discriminate against me, I shall never become bitter or lose faith, for I know that such persons are not representative of the majority of the American people. True, I shall do all in my power to discourage such practices, but I shall do it in the American way: above-board, in the open, through courts of law, by education, by proving myself to be worthy of equal treatment and consideration. I am firm in my belief that American sportsmanship and attitude of fair play will judge citizenship and patriotism on the basis of action and achievement, and not on the basis of physical characteristics.

Because I believe in America, and I trust she believes in me, and because I have received innumerable benefits from her, I pledge myself to do honor to her at all times and in all places; to support her constitution, to obey her laws; to respect her flag, to defend her against all enemies, foreign or domestic, to actively assume my duties and obligations as a citizen, cheerfully and without any reservations whatsoever, in the hope that I may become a better American in a greater America.

The Ryan's Well Foundation, founded by 14-year old Ryan Hrejac of Kemptville, Ontario, reports that the \$12,000 resulting from the 2005 National IFYE Conference Service Project (the \$6,000 raised at the conference was matched by the Canadian government) contributed water taps and latrine construction in Yeka Kifleketema, a suburban area of Addis Ababa, Ethiopia.

The project included the connection of six communal tap water points and 55 individual tap points to the most needy households. In addition, funds were used for latrines.

To date, the Ryan's Well Foundation has contributed 238 wells serving over 395,000 people in 11 countries. Hrejac was 6 years old when he was moved to find a way to provide water wells in developing countries. 2005 Conference Service Project Provides \$12,000 Benefit for

Anita Hakkila Smiley, CT-Finland 1956, celebrated her 50th Anniversary as an IFYE by leading a special tour to Finland. It was her twelfth and largest tour group since 1986, when her first tour fulfilled her "desire to acquaint more people with a

country which far too few people know."

During the 16-day tour, the group traveled the length and breadth of Finland, visiting rural areas little known to tourists.

In commemoration of her 50th Anniversary as an IFYE, Anita included the entire group in a visit to one of her host families. And on July 1, she arranged a dinner and program honoring her host families, the Suomen 4H-Litto (Finnish 4-H) national staff, 4-H friends, and her newest host - son Greg and his family. Every host family was represented.

Kirsti Hirvensalo, long-time Finnish 4H exchange coordinator, known to many early U.S. delegates, was unable to attend the celebration due to a broken hip. Anita visits Kirsti on most visits to Finland.

The Connecticut IFYE Committee commissioned a wallhanging, which Anita presented to the Finland 4-H Federation. Paivi Haapasalo, 4-H International Secretary, accepted it in behalf of the Federation.

Anita has kept in touch with all of her host families, including children and grandchildren who have become fam-

ily and friends. Anita's son, Greg, is married to a Finn he met when traveling with Anita in 1993 to learn about his grandparents' country. Greg and his wife, Soile, and their children live in Masku. The grandchildren increase the desire for Grandma Anita and Grandpa

Jack to visit even more frequently. Their two daughters have visited Finland and their youngest, Sharleann, was an IFYE to Taiwan in 1996.

In addition to Finland tours, The Smiley Group, as her program is known (smileys.place@juno.com) has also organized tours to other countries...all with the aim of strengthening international understanding.

WRITING ABOUT MY IFYE EXPERIENCES

Michigan-Germany 1953

Throughout the years since I was an IFYE delegate to Germany, I have heard of literally hundreds of benefits various IFYEs have gained from their foreign adventures. Here are just a few examples: People will often cite the fact that they learned acceptance of other cultures than our own, that they acquired a "global perspective" on world problems, or that the experience led the way toward their following meaningful careers in some type of business or service located in another country. During my working years I was never employed outside the borders of the United States but I would like to lay claim to one important asset which may be legitimately laid at the feet of *my* IFYE experience. That is, I have been able to use my IFYE adventures as subject matter for much of my writing.

From 1954 until the end of the 1985-86 school year (over thirty years total) I taught social studies, mainly history and geography, in a number of Michigan schools. About a decade after my retirement I moved to Albuquerque, New Mexico, to leave the harsh Michigan winters and high humidity behind and to experience the ambiance that the Southwest provides in many different ways. Not only did I begin a new life in a far different environment, but I also embarked on a new career - that of being a freelance writer.

My initial writing took the form of little vignettes or articles, which were published in the newsletters of several Albuquerque organizations. I wrote about everyday things that happened to me and I found that my IFYE experiences, even though they happened nearly fifty years before that, were a veritable gold mine of subjects for stories. Those events had made an indelible impression on my mind and I was able to recall them in minute detail.

In 2001, I began writing my first book. It is called *Home on the Farm*, and is a collection of twenty-five little stories about growing up in the rural Thumb Area of Michigan during the 1930s and 1940s. One prominent part of the book describes the awe which I felt when I, a Michigan farm youth in his teens, was chosen as an IFYE delegate to help represent the United States in Europe by living and working with German farm families. In my estimation, things just didn't get any better than that. *Home on the Farm* was published in the fall of 2003.

Shortly after the first book was published I began writing my second which is called **Tales of the Road**. The volume is a group of stories about some of the odd, strange and curious events which have occurred when I have been traveling somewhere in the world over the past fifty or more years.

The first chapter, called "The Foreigner," describes my feelings of alienation when our IFYE group first landed in Bremerhaven, Germany. In it I recount my fledgling attempts at actually speaking German to Germans for the first time. The chapter goes on to relate how, as I became more and more familiar with the customs, I felt less and less like a foreigner. **Tales of the Road** owes its very existence to the fact that I was an IFYE.

At the present, writing has become a nearly full-time occupation for me. Not only do I still pen monthly articles for newsletters, but now I am a staff writer for a local Albuquerque magazine called, **Posh New Mexico**, as well. About six months ago I began my third book which will be titled **Leafing Through My Family Tree**, and it, like all my other writing, will draw in part from my own IFYE experiences.

Duain W. Vierow Emphasizes "IFYE Changed My Whole Life!"

"IFYE changed my whole life and I thank God for it," says Duain W. Vierow, MN-Netherlands 1957. His experience was the beginning of a worldwide venture that has lasted a lifetime.

A philosophy and art major, he graduated from Hamline University in St. Paul in 1957. Following his IFYE experience, he completed studies at Luther Seminary in St. Paul and the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago. He also studied part time at the Minneapolis School of Art. He received his Doctor of Missiology degree from Fuller Theological Seminary in 1976.

Duain served as a missionary in Southeast Asia between 1960 and 1980. On return to Minnesota, he served several Lutheran congregations until his retirement in 1993.

Art has permeated his entire career. Though it was secondary for some 30 years, the desire was always there. He pursued it vigorously when he and his wife, Donna, moved to The Villages, Florida, when he retired.

His interest in art started early in life and was influenced greatly by his parents. His father especially nurtured his appreciation of the natural world. "Painting is for me a spiritual experience, a divine encounter of

media, a God-given idea, and a person's ability to create," he writes.

Duain works in a variety of mediums: layered acrylics, oils, watercolors, even pottery and clay. His styles vary from impressionistic to abstract. He favors abstract. All of his work has one thing in common - bright colors. "I love color. I'm a colorist," he shares.

In recent years, Parkinson's Disease has impacted his painting in several ways. It forced him to be more creative in design and technique and he now has to use both hands to paint, using his left hand to steady his right.

Duain has artist friends in several countries and brings a global perspective to his work. "In my travels, to over 60 countries, I try to visit places and have conversations with local people that give clues as to how local culture, faith and terrain have influenced art," he emphasizes.

He belongs to six art organizations and has exhibited widely in the Central Florida area. His awards are numerous, including "best of show!" His work is part of private collections in Europe, Asia, and North and South America.

In retirement, Duain helped start a new congregation in Florida and currently serves on the Lutheran Synod committee with coordination responsibility for the country of Suriname in South America. He was also instrumental in the establishment of the Global Mission Institute at Luther Seminary in St. Paul.

Duain emphasizes, "IFYE changed life and I thank God for it. I have visited my second home - The Netherlands - many times and am grateful for the welcome I always receive. The ideals, experience and contacts continue to enrich my life."

Remember the above photo in the Summer/Fall 2005 issue? It was taken during the spring orientation for 1955 IFYE delegates. They were meeting with the late Kathleen Flom, then National 4-H Council's regional him when he returned home, "You represented America well!" IFYE director for Europe.

Rev./Dr. Walter G. Berryman, VA-England/Wales, saw it and responded. He was in the photo (top center) and proudly points out that he was the first black delegate to participate in a 4-H International exchange. He had much praise for Kathleen Flom, and for Barbara Tylden, the exchange coordinator for the England/Wales program.

Reflecting, he commented, "I traveled to Washington by bus and took a cab to the hotel where the orientation was being held. When I arrived at the hotel, my black cab driver said, 'If you can register at this hotel, your cab fare is free.' It was free!"

He recalled an experience when with his host family on the Isle of Wight. The toddler in the family would run whenever he was around early in his stay. Soon and much to everyone's surprise, the toddler would always choose to sit on Walter's lap.

He also remembers the surprise on the interviewer's face during a BBC Interview when introduced as a delegate from Africa and he responded

with emphasis, "I'm from Virginia!"

And he remembers with pride a comment that Kathleen Flom made to

In summing up his IFYE experience, he comments, "It grew me up!" He then finished seminary at Virginia Union University in Richmond.

He and his wife, Joan, were married in June 1956. Their hopes of having a family dimmed when the doctor told them they could not have children. Joan decided to pursue her teaching career. Very soon thereafter, a surprise! Joan was pregnant with their first child. And after a time, they raised five children; and now speak with pride of their eight grands.

The saddest moment in their lives came in 1992 when their second child was murdered when cashing his first paycheck...just a few blocks from their home. The murder was never solved. Walter comments, "We forgave whoever it was and went on with our lives. There was no other way!"

Walter is now in his 27th year at St. John Baptist Church in Milford, Virginia, where is started his ministry in 1979. He likes to point out a statement that appears on their church bulletin every Sunday, "If you do for the Lord while you can, He will do for you when you can't!"
