# National 4-H Hall of Fame Laureats Three 4-H International Exchange Alumni Honored

Three 4-H International Exchange alumni were inducted into the National 4-H Hall of Fame during a ceremony at the National 4-H Youth Conference Center early in October. They include (t-b) James C. Kemp, IFYE CO-Ireland 1955; the late Rhonwyn Lowry, IFYE GA-Denmark 1951; and A. Lois Redman, Professional Rural Youth Leader (PRYLE) OR-Sweden 1968 and the International Extension 4-H Travel Seminar to South Asia 1973.



Following 10 years as a Colorado 4-H member and university days, Jim worked for Extension in Colorado, Pennsylvania, Indiana and Minnesota. He is recognized nationally for his pioneer 4-H work in urban areas—especially in Philadelphia in the mid 1960's. After moving to Minnesota he was County Extension Director in the Twin Cities area for 10 years. From 1988 until his retirement in 1994, he was Assistant Director, and then Interim Director for the Minnesota 4-H Foundation. He served as President of the National Association of Extension 4-H Agents (NAE4-HA) and the Minnesota Association of Extension Agents. He was honored with the NAE4-HA Distinguished Service Award.

Rhonwyn, honored posthumously, worked with Extension in Georgia for some 15 years in both the 4-H and Home Economics programs, before joining the USDA Extension Service as Deputy Assistant Administrator, 4-H Youth, where she served until her retirement in 1979. She served on the National 4-H Foundation (now Council) Board of Directors, and several national and state volunteer positions. She conducted Georgia's first People-to-People goodwill mission—for 4-H members to Eastern and Western Europe. Special recognition included being selected for Outstanding Young Women of America in 1965, Personalities of the South in 1971, Women in Action—USDA, and Who's Who in American Government. She died in 2007.

During her 35-year Extension Home Economics and 4-H career, Lois focused on home economics, outdoor education and 4-H International programs. She first worked in Missouri, then 30+ years as Extension Specialist, 4-H Youth Programs—20 in Oregon and 10 in Kansas before retiring in 1988. She worked to upgrade project judging, increased camp staff and counselor training, and helped increase support for camping programs—resulting in an Oregon State Camp facility. She served as State 4-H International Programs coordinator in both Oregon and Kansas. She was involved with the Oregon-Costa Rica and Kansas-Paraguay Partners of the Americas programs—developing training opportunities, exchanges, and scholarship programs. Her PRYLE experience included visiting 4-H and other youth programs in some 25 countries. She received the National Epsilon Sigma Phi International Service Award, the Partners of the Americas Award for Youth Programming, the Kansas and National IFYE Associations Friend of IFYE recognition, and was inducted into the Oregon Extension Hall of Fame. Her volunteer work also has an international flavor teaching English as a Second Language, International committees for many organizations, hosting international visitors. In retirement, she escorts Senior bus trips in the U.S., Canada and Europe.





# Indiana's Annabel Rupel Awarded Friend of IFYE Recognition

Annabel Rupel, Indiana's State 4-H International Programs coordinator, 1973-1981, was recognized and presented with the "Friend of IFYE" recognition by the IFYE Association of the USA during the 2009 National IFYE Conference in Fort Wayne. The award was presented by Robert Ellis, IN-Gambia 1971, and past president of the national association.

Annabel joined the Indiana Cooperative Extension Service at Purdue University in 1951. Following 10 years as a county Home Economics agent, she joined the State 4-H staff in 1962. She served as Extension 4-H Specialist for Home Economics and 4-H International programs until her retirement in 1981.

In 1969, Annabel led a group of 60 4-H youth on a People-to-People exchange to Europe and the Soviet Union. She guided 4-H International programs during the peak years when Indiana sent young people to other countries through IFYE, the 4-H Japanese exchanges, a special program with Poland focusing on technical agriculture for students, and worked closely with a host family organization that provided hosting experiences for incoming participants.

To internationalize the 4-H curriculum, she developed a program entitled "People of My World" to help all 4-H youth gain an understanding of family history, other cultures and the world.

Annabel took a sabbatical to enhance her personal international growth in 1976, during which she lived and taught in Nigeria, West Africa. She is still active in the international arena, continues to travel, and volunteers with international events and studies. She remains active in her church and retirement community. And, her love for 4-H International Programs continues!

# 50 Years Ago.....8th National IFYE Conference in 1959 Millersville State Teachers College - Millersville, Pennsylvania



From the Archives...The 8th National IFYE Conference in 1959 was one of the last events to be held at the Millersville State Teachers College in Pennsylvania. It became Millersville State College that same year. And the presidency of the IFYE Association of the USA passed from Edwin C. Hadlock, NY-Columbia 1953, to Robert Hume, MA-Tunisia 1952. The College was known as the Lancaster County Normal School when founded in 1855 until 1859 when it became the Millersville State Normal School. In 1983, it gained university status as Millersville University of Pennsylvania.

"She Can Cook Supper for 3 or 300" was the headline in a Washington Post article on August 10, 1961. The 10th Conference was held at the National 4-H Center. She was also food chairman for the 6th Conference in Kentucky in 1957. Those were the days when alumni did all!

"It's easy to find opportunities for youth to contribute to their own communities. One of the great things about Michigan 4-H is that it helps youth spread their wings and learn about the world beyond their county, state and national borders," an excerpt from the Michigan Extension Weekly Spotlight, a newsletter from Thomas G. Coon, Director, Michigan State University Extension.

Judy Huynh, a volunteer 4-H leader, developed a model service learning project for her World Wide Kids 4-H Club in Ionia County, Michigan. The club recently hosted an international dinner and raised over \$800 for Heifer International -

providing funds to purchase rabbits, chickens, a goat, a sheep, a pig and a water buffalo for families around the world to help alleviate hunger and poverty through sound agricultural practices. For information on Heifer International: www.Heiferinternational.org.

Then the club branched out to learn about global micro-finance and entrepreneurship through Kiva, a micro-lending organization that connects potential lenders with low-income entrepreneurs around the world. They loaned \$50 to a woman in Liberia planning to open a rice store.

Larry J. Zilliox, 4-H Youth Development Project (YDP) delegate, MN-Botswana 1968, saw evidence of the benefits of the Kiva loan program during recent country visits, including Botswana, in connection with his trip to the World IFYE Conference in Australia last fall. He is the immediate past president of the IFYE Association of the USA, and is encouraging individuals and organizations to provide support.

Kiva is the world's first person-to-person micro-lending website, empowering individuals to lend to unique entrepreneurs around the globe. Its mission is to connect people through lending for the sake of alleviating poverty. Kiva creates an interpersonal connection at low costs due to the instant, inexpensive nature of internet delivery. Learn more on their website: www.kiva.org.

# **IFYE Alum Frederick E. Fisher, PA-Pakistan 1957 - 52 Years Later!** Founded International Development Institute for Organization and Management (IDIOM) Awarded Slovakia National Laureate Recognition

"When I dragged myself into the hospital in Rawalpindi, Pakistan, in the autumn of 1957 with a temp of 106 and moisture seeping out of every part of my body, I did not declare, 'I'm here to dedicate my life to the IFYE spirit and international development," comments Fred Fisher, PA-Pakistan 1957. It was soon after his arrival that he was already experiencing hepatitis, amoebic dysentery and malaria—an unexpected detour in the IFYE experience. He was soon back to the villages and the continuation of an experience that virtually lasted 50 years.

He often reflects on the moment when he got involved—several years following his 4-H membership days. Urania Belle Linn, PA-Luxembourg 1955, was the Extension 4-H Agent in his home county, where he was farming after completing his military service and enrolling at Allegheny College. He heard her IFYE story and she encouraged him to apply—a story you hear repeated often by 4-H International exchange alumni.

On return from Pakistan, he completed his Bachelor's degree in Economics and Master's degree in Government Administration. His career then included positions in city management in Pennsylvania and with the International City/County Management Association's Center for Professional Development and the National Training and Development Service in Washington, D.C. He completed a second Master's and a Doctorate in Public Administration at the University of California in 1975 and 1977.

The remnants of his early Pakistan medical experience escaped his mind and the message "That's where it's at!" rang clear. His focus and interest was on service and the international arena.

He completed a decade on the staff at Pennsylvania State University, during which he spent almost five years on a USAID contract in Kenya—working with local governments, NGOs and emerging community-based organizations on affordable housing for the poorest of the poor throughout the African continent. "It was exhilarating, exhausting, and humbling. I never looked back," he reflects.

When they returned to the U.S., he and his wife, Peggy, started a two-person venture—the International Development Institute for Organization and Management (IDIOM). Their headquarters was the back of their garage in rural Pennsylvania. A virtual organization—it was low on overhead; high on results. They started by writing one training manual after another; more than 70 as they retired. In addition, there were over 120 articles and monographs. Will there be more? He smiled. Wouldn't be surprising!

"It was a good development model...low cost, no strings, easy-touse," Fred emphasizes. One series on Local Elected Leadership (LEL), was eventually translated into some 30 languages and used worldwide. The interlocking mechanism was a hands-on training of trainers (TOT) workshop. Fred shares, "In one TOT venture in Egypt in 1995, I was training the first covey of Arabic-language trainers on using the LEL series. They, in turn, were training Egyptian elected officials. At the same time, two Romanians I trained in an Eastern European TOT a few years earlier, were in India conducting the first training program in India for trainers from the sub-continent."

Interspersed with writing assignments from UN Habitat and other organizations like the Soros Foundation, he had short-term consulting assignments on development projects, three Fulbright grants, two and a half years in Slovakia, and an opportunity to conduct a worldwide conference on Low Income Housing in China preceded by a two-week family visit to the area as guests of the City of Kunming.

Amongst his many positions held, he served on the Board of Directors for the Partners Romanian Foundation and the IFYE Association of the USA. He is an advisor to the Project Gettysburg-Leon (Nicaragua) Sister Cities program and serves on the Fulbright Peer Selection Review Selection Committee. Fred and Peggy are active with the Menallen Friends Meeting, a Quaker group with a fascinating history of involvement with the freedom seekers and the Underground Railroad.

"My IFYE spirit has taken me to over 50 countries on varied development challenges, most recently in Iraq, Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Myanmar, Ethiopia, Romania, and Vietnam. All of the experiences were 'Iffy' living at times, but all were IFYE inspired."

Fred's career changed to retirement last summer. It was topped off with a coveted national laureate recognition award by the Slovakian National Association of Local Governments (ZMOS). Only four individuals have been so honored, including two past presidents of the Republic of Slovakia.

Fred and Peggy live the retired life in Biglerville, Pennsylvania. They have one daughter and three sons—all nearby. Fred would tell you that he is the only man in upper Adams County who mows his lawn carrying a framed copy of the Magna Carta and his ZMOS Escutcheon! (What an interview! It took 11 e-mails and nine telephone calls pre-scrutinized with his telephone ID! When you get to know Fred, you'll understand! Quite a career!)

# National IFYE Association Dues: An Explanation

As the Association continues to locate "lost" 4-H International exchange participants and encourage participation among alumni, several questions have surfaced that trigger the need to explain the basics of dues. Even if you are a life member, please read this in its entirety.

Dues are the life-blood of the operation of the Association. All persons that have an interest in 4-H International exchanges initiated and continued since 1948 are allowed to join and support our efforts.

Annual dues are currently at \$25 per year per person and are due the first of each calendar year. Annual dues for couples are \$40. Historically, we have only had around 100 persons paying annual dues. Can you imagine operating a nationwide exchange alumni program for about \$2,500 per year? That is what we have been attempting to accomplish! To supplement operation costs we have relied on investment interest for life memberships (explained later) and donations for operational purposes. Annual dues are essential to the survival of the Association.

In 1967, Life Memberships were created with the amount paid deposited in an investment account and the interest is used for operational purposes. Life memberships began at \$100 per person and currently are \$300 per person and \$400 per couple. Each life member receives a letter of acknowledgement and an embossed life membership card with his or her own unique number. Life membership removes you from the requirement of paying annual memberships in order to be a member.

Confusion regarding life memberships has occurred with individuals feeling they are an Association member because they were an exchange participant. That is not the case; dues must be paid to be a member. Also, the Association has decided to send a newsletter to all alumni regardless of whether they pay dues. This decision is based upon the belief that it is more important to maintain contact than to collect dues. While admirable, the reality is the budget of the Association needs more income than expense.

Confusion has also occurred when individuals have joined their State Associations and think they are life members of the national organization. That is not true. Currently 1171 persons are life members of the National Association. Only by paying life membership dues does one hold the distinction of being a National IFYE Association member.

Bottom-line: YOU ARE IMPORTANT TO THE ASSOCIA-TION! If you are reading this and have not paid life or annual dues, the Association has included you and you are not paying your share! If your personal finances allow, please consider paying \$25 for 2009 and \$25 for 2010 now. You have already received the benefits for 2009. As we move forward with possible reconnection with 4-H on the national level, your support is needed now more than ever. Please use the dues form above or contact a board member if you have concerns and/or questions.

### Robert F. Ernst, WY-Ireland/North Ireland 1952 Murdered in Sheridan, Wyoming

Bob Ernst, WY-Ireland/NI 1952, and his wife, Linda, were sound asleep when three young men broke into their home early the morning of August 26, 2009. The house had been ramsacked before they came to the bedroom door and shined flashlights in their faces. Linda yelled. Bob woke and sat up. They shot him twice. Linda still wonders why they didn't shoot her. He died at 3:00 a.m. at the hospital.

Sadly, the three boys were local teen-agers, 19, 16 and 15. It is alleged that the 15year-old pulled the trigger. They were caught later that morning. Three trials are pending; set for March at this time.

Bob and Linda have remained in regular contact with his host families and had exchanged occasional visits. John and Maureen Gault, one of his host families in 1952 had spent two weeks with them in 2008. On receiving the news, the Gaults immediately flew to Wyoming for the funeral and a week with Linda and family.

Bob and Linda had planned to take their children and grandchildren to visit Ireland and North Ireland and his host families this coming summer in celebration of his 80th birthday. Linda has it on hold—it now depends on the trial schedules.

Bob was retired from the Rental Equipment business they owned in Sheridan. He was a lifetime member of the IFYE Association. Linda recently wrote, "Thanks to everyone for the cards and messages I've received from around the country. I was not an IFYE, but I sure loved one!" 🛠

### Barbara A. Bean, MA-France 1950 Strong Supporter of Exchanges and Host Family Connections

Barbara Bean was a strong supporter of Massachusetts exchanges and had a very close relationship with her host families—they exchanged visits often. She taught school in Kentucky, the American HS in Heidelberg, Germany, and Windsor, CT, before retiring in 1988. She helped establish a student exchange between the Gisors Lycee in France and the Windsor HS, which continues today.

Barbara's cremains will be divided and buried in her family plot in Massachusetts and a host family's plot on their farm in France.
