IFYE Foundation and Association Join Together

In late May 2013, both the Foundation and the Association Boards voted to come together as one organization. After many years of operating the Foundation and the Association separately, with separate Board of Directors, and separate operating functions, the two came together and formed one Board of Directors with representatives from both organizations. The Foundation will begin to function again according to its original intent which was to support the IFYE Association of the USA, Inc. This unified approach will be less confusing to the general public and will assist us in successfully securing grants and monies from outside the alumni.

In early April 2013, Marsha Carey, our contracted grant writer, told us. "IFYE needs only one identity. Currently there are two. Both are presented on the web and in the IFYE NEWS and both are raising funds. It appears as if both are the same. To be perceived as relevant, IFYE must have strong branding which includes marketing, web presence, printed materials, and a clear mission." To fix our image problem, both Boards recognized the need to come together as one. In order to bring the IFYE program back, both Boards wanted to move toward a professional organizational structure including future professional staffing.

Why now? Why not wait a year or so?

The Reposition Committee, in 2011 and 2012, focused our attention on a number of potential partners that could help to identify potential IFYE applicants. Alan Lambert, Partner Development Contractor and past IFYE Association President, is finding young people very interested in an international cultural exchange. If we hope to have serious IFYE applicants ready to go in 2014, this work and effort needs to be continued now. That takes staffing and funding now to facilitate those 2014 exchanges.

How did the two organizations come together?

Effective June 14 and 15, during face-to-face Board meetings in Illinois, a new Association Board was established with members from both Boards serving on the new Association Board. *See further information about new Board members and officers within this newsletter.*

What happens to the IFYE Foundation?

The IFYE Foundation will continue to exist within the IFYE Association. To comply with Colorado laws to keep its incorporation, the Foundation will continue to have a President, currently Marj Loyd, and a Treasurer, currently Dale Yonker. They are both on the Association Board of Directors and the activities of the Foundation will take place in collaboration with the Association Board of Directors. The Foundation has revised its Bylaws to meet the new requirements. The Association Funds Management Committee" which will make recommendations to

the full board regarding the expenditures and investments of all current funds held by both the Association and the Foundation.

What needs to be done next?

The Association Board will continue to meet monthly and has several task oriented committees that are working to revitalize IFYE. The Board is revising Association Bylaws that will be coming to the Association active membership for their approval. The Association's Policies and Procedures Manual is being revised to accurately reflect the new IFYE Board operation and direction. A firm has been contracted to redesign our website starting this summer. After the strategic planning session in June led by Marsha Carey, a strategic plan will be adopted by the Board. This plan (when implemented) will help the Association improve its image and help position IFYE to be recognized as the **"premier international exchange program with host family experiences"** for those 19 and over.

We and the new Board are excited about what our IFYE program can become during the next few years. We look forward to your support in changing the Association Bylaws and of the positive direction IFYE has taken. We look forward to realizing that "IFYE Returns".

National IFYE Program Coordinator Position

The Association is looking for a National IFYE Program Coordinator as the Association endeavors to increase the IFYE program to include more states and participants. This proposed Program Coordinator would work with existing state coordinators to learn the "ropes" and begin to build exchange programs in states that currently do not have a state coordinator. Eventually, duties associated with this position would likely expand to include working with country contacts around the world, as well as coordinating exchange planning efforts with states sending and receiving delegates.

A State Coordinator Handbook is being developed to unify procedures and standards. This will be a valuable resource for all involved, whether they are paid state or national staff, or volunteers in various states. This National Program Coordinator will work internationally developing strong relationships with existing and new country participants.

Currently, the IFYE Association envisions this proposed coordinator position to initially be a volunteer or limited compensated position with expenses reimbursed. This could evolve into a contract employee on a part-time basis or eventually a full time position.

The IFYE Association is looking for an individual, now, so he/ she may be involved in planning for 2014 exchanges, with a goal of taking a more prominent role in the fall of 2014 for exchanges beginning in 2015.

IFYE Orientation Experiences: My Favorite Volunteer Job *Crystal Yonker*

What is a uniquely American meal? How about a picnic with lemonade, hot dogs cooked on a stick over an open fire, chips, watermelon and s'mores? After a tour of Ropp's Farm and cheese making facility, the 2013 current inbound and outbound IFYEs enjoyed cooking their own hot dogs and s'mores to perfection. Hosts Carol and Ray (1964 IL IFYE to India) Ropp further extended the cultural experience with a hayride through their farmland near Normal, IL.

It has been said IFYEs are leaders, creative and "let's do it" people. The 2013 class is no different as evidenced by the multicultural entertainment they provided after the picnic. Volunteers participated in the Finnish wife-carrying race, wife-finding dance from Wales, typical dance at weddings in Greece, traditional games played during mid-summer in Sweden, American line dancing to Cotton Eyed Joe, clapping game from Taiwan that ended in the international rock-paper-scissors competition. Delegates from Scotland and Austria wore traditional dress from their countries. Some delegates showed maps of their country or USA state and then quizzed the audience about specialties of their corner of the world. Some had other educational information such as: "there are no kangaroos in Austria", and the location of Dorothy's home in Kansas.

The IFYE alums participated as willingly in the work and play as those being oriented. That proved, no matter the age, IFYEs just want to work hard, learn, and have fun! Many of the inbounds were surprised and pleased that all of the Americans they had encountered were so friendly and helpful.

The 2013 IFYE Inbound/Outbound Orientation was held June 14 to 17 in Bloomington, IL. There were 21 inbounds from 11 countries going to 5 US states and 7 outbounds from 4 states going to 11 countries. Most of the 28 were wearing jeans and t-shirts upon arrival, proving that is the common international dress.

For the English-as-a-second language (or third or fourth) inbounds, the initial distinguishing unfamiliar vocabulary word was when they were asked to "initial" the hotel registration form.

A word everyone seemed to be familiar with was "Wal-Mart". For forgotten, lost, or damaged items, transportation to local stores was available.

The purpose of orientation is to help each exchangee adapt to a new and different culture. Late on the second day, Harlen Persinger (1970 IA IFYE to Norway) asked a group of inbounds if they were anxious about anything and to what they were looking forward. None were anxious or afraid. They were looking forward to all the new unknown experiences. Most had heard about the 4th of July celebrations; some hoped to see the mountains. Many commented on how b-i-g everything is (i.e. the wide open spaces, farm fields, stores, their motel rooms in Bloomington).

I had so much fun as a SpIFYE (spouse of Dale Yonker [1963 CO IFYE to Turkey]) volunteer for 2013 IFYE Orientation. I enjoyed visiting with representatives from all around the world. I learned about each individual, his/her country, culture and language. The 60 hours of orientation went much too quickly. I am ready to do it again ... after a few days' rest! G'day Mate!

G'day, Mate! In Aussie "slanguage", this means "pleased to meet you". We not only met people of all kinds, we learned about their lifestyles, partook in family activities, threw a few "snags" (sausages) on the barbie, and had a pretty "grouse" (terrific) time, on our IFYE exchange to Tasmania. The six weeks flew by fast and the memories we made will last a lifetime.

The Tasmanian Rural Youth clubs can be compared to 4-H clubs here in the US. The program consists of about 300 members coming from three regions with five clubs in each region. The age range is from 15-30 years old. Rural Youth is all about "friends, fun, training, and travel." Categories of competitions held throughout the year include: cooking, craft, photography, team debating and quiz, drama, clay and rifle shooting, stock judging, fleece handling, and sheep shearing.

Like IFYE, they too have outbound and inbound exchanges. The aim of the Rural Youth exchange program is to promote international understanding and develop better informed young people by providing an opportunity to learn about:

- The way of life in Australia the culture and the people.
- Get along with people by living in their home, NOT as a guest, but as a member of the family.
- Understanding the farming and urban situation, some of the challenges associated with it and how the Rural Youth movement fits into the educational pattern
- Become better informed on world affairs and conscious of world citizenship.
- Improve communication skills

The first part of our exchange was spent at AgFest. This is a threeday event similar to our state fair. Rural Youth members and the people of Tasmania look forward to it every year. Twenty-nine years ago, Rural Youth began running the AgFest to support their programs. In the beginning, about 9,000 people visited over a 2-day span. Today, around 60,000-80,000 people visit over the Thursday, Friday, and Saturday event.

We worked along with the Rural Youth to organize and set up for the fest. At 80 hectares (almost 200 acres), it is a massive piece of land and is mostly filled during the three days of AgFest. Vendor booths (large tents or marques) were being set up, farm machinery being placed, and wood chips being hauled in. Day by day, you could see the progression of many hardworking hands. A few of the many things we did included: painting doors, marking spots out for vendors in the craft sheds, and installing arm rests onto

benches. We parked cars, worked at the ticket booth and in the Rural Youth promotion tent during the fest. The nine days felt long and tiresome, but spending time with the other exchangees, hearing stories of how each other's day went, and meeting many of the Rural Youth members was great fun.

Southbound we go! After AgFest, we traveled to Hobart, the capital of Tasmania. There we spent our time staying in suburban and rural homes. From day one, we never ran out of things to do. We were taken to the Salamanca Market, went on a beer brewery tour and drove 20km to the top of Mt. Wellington. One of the Rural Youth members took us on a day trip through the Huon Valley to visit fish hatcheries along the coast. Not knowing much about fish, we found the Tassal-Tasmanian salmon hatcheries very interesting. Driving along, you get a real feel for an area. We saw hops and poppy fields that were foreign to us. Throughout the exchange, we encountered wildlife in their natural habitats. We saw wild wallabies, kangaroos, possums, bandicoots, owls and even a platypus.

We six exchangees (*England, Scotland, Ireland, Canada, and us*) did many day trips together, usually with a Rural Youth member along. One of our expeditions included driving to South Cape the southern-most edge of Australia. The ocean never ceases to amaze us. In Tasmania, you are no more than two hours away from one. We have lakes and rivers here in South Dakota, but there is nothing like the feeling of looking across vast ocean waters, feeling the breeze, the smell of salt in the air, and the feeling of perfect, fine sand between your toes. Where there is a beach, there will always be a Fish 'N Chips shop nearby. Baked or flaked fish 'n chips (flaked fish and french fries) were always guaranteed to be fresh and delicious. Being back home, that is something we miss.

The last 10 days of our exchange were spent in northern Tasmania, where we first began our Aussie adventure. There, we experienced farm life. Our host family lived on a dairy farm outside of

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Scottsdale in the Dorset region. We <u>enjoyed</u> herding the cows into the milking barn. The baby calves were adorable. We <u>loved</u> being outside, riding the 2-wheeler, and having something different to do each day. We found the sights, sounds, smells, and atmosphere farms create quite enjoyable. We tried our hands at milking, which is harder than it looks. We went wallaby and possum hunting with our family. Our host mother drove us to a family member's to go kayaking one of the days too. We also developed the skill of whip cracking. We would practice until our arms and wrists were sore; but, by the end of the week, we were professionals.

"Being involved in 4-H has been a great experience; and getting the chance to be an IFYE was a great opportunity. I am so glad to have gone on the exchange. It was a great way to live, learn, and meet new people in a different country. I would recommend being an IFYE to anyone who is outgoing, flexible, likes people, and [is] willing to learn." [Liz]

Association Board Activities

Introduction: This past spring, the Association Board initiated a communication link regarding activities of the Board to all those indicating that we could use their email address. This information has been sent regarding the monthly conference calls since then and is called "Association Board Bulletin". It is sent to those on MailChimp and those having non-MailChimp email. Association Board Highlights

May 12, 2013 IFYE Association Board Conference Call Fifteen of the sixteen Board members participated.

SELECTED ITEMS DISCUSSED/ACTION TAKEN:

- **Foundation Board Report** Marj Loyd, President, announced that the Foundation has given 10 scholarships to outbound IFYEs in amounts ranging from \$350 to \$500 per individual. (*Two scholarships each went to Idaho and South Dakota and three each to Colorado and Kansas.*) On May 5th, the Foundation Board approved the reworking of a Letter of Intent to move forward to join the Association Board. Four members each from the Foundation and Association are to make recommendations for the restructuring of the new consolidated Association Board.
- **IFYE Association Board's proposed new structure:** Dick Wagner and Betty Jo Smith-Roberts explained that all persons currently serving on both the Association and Foundation Boards (*Board members, ex-officio Board members, advisors*) will be contacted on a conference call. This call will be to establish whether or not the person wishes to continue on the new Association Board or in any capacity on a committee and the eligibility for committee membership.
- **Training Contract:** A Board Email Vote (*held between April 26 and 28, 2013*) resulted in the approval of Marsha Carey's contract to train members of a newly organized Association Board. As recommended by the Executive Committee, this contract includes pre-training research and post-training follow-up. Training will take place in Illinois in June.
- **Concept of hiring a part-time Executive Director**: It is recommended that we hire a part-time Executive Director to get us going for 12-18 months; then, possibly, hire a full-time Executive Director. Final decisions will be made by the new IFYE Association Board.
- **Partnering Advisory Committee update** As of April 30, 2013. Farm Bureau has agreed to be a communication partner for IFYE and approved IFYE to continue to work with Farm Bureau and Young Farmers & Ranchers in states that are interested in promoting the IFYE program.
- **Program Planning Committee update:** A motion was made and passed to give Alan Lambert the authority to act on behalf of the IFYE Association in matters of delegate insurance coverage in 2013. The Program Planning Committee also worked on standardization of forms, National Coordinator Handbook, and looking at helping Western PA to revive their IFYE program.
- **Recruitment of 2014 Board Members**: Betty Jo Smith-Roberts announced that the following people have agreed to join the <u>Association Board in January 2014</u> although they will begin meeting with the Board in June and after during this year: Jean

Richardson (NH), Mike Coates (IA), and Andy Smyth (ID). Region B is still to be determined.

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Association Board Highlights

June 15, 2013 IFYE Association Board Meeting

A Face-to-Face Meeting in Bloomington, IL

Note: This was the first meeting of the newly consolidated Board composed of both Foundation and previous Association Board members. It followed a day-and-a-half training on governance and fundraising by Marsha Carey, Non-profit Consultant. Twelve of the fifteen Board Members were present plus one 2014 Board Member.

SELECTED ITEMS DISCUSSED/ACTION TAKEN:

- Election of Officers (through December 31, 2013): Voting was done office by office after the floor was opened for nominations for each office. No nominations from the floor were given and the slate was unanimously approved. (See results on page 2 of this newsletter.)
 - The Immediate Past President of the Association (a nonelected office) will be held by Marj Loyd
 - Dick Wagner appointed **Dale Yonker** to sit on the Executive Committee as the **Treasurer of the Foundation Funds**.
 - Maurice Johnson will hold the appointed position of **Resource Development Liaison**. The person in this appointed position is a liaison with the contracted individuals.
- **Use of a CPA Firm Norma Wu, Treasurer:** With the potential influx of grants and IFYE Returns, donations may exceed \$50,000 and we should seek professional tax preparation by a CPA. A committee was charged with gathering information about CPA and bookkeeping services reporting back to the Board in July.
- Partner Development Report Alan Lambert, Partner Development Director: Alan indicated that the actual expenses were 51% of the amount originally budgeted. He also suggested that we move in the direction of "controlling" our own program, instead of "partnering" with another entity to become the <u>premier international exchange program</u> for age 19 and over.
- **Program Development Report Alan Lambert:** Discussion centered around a "Program with a Purpose". A motion was made and passed that the Program Committee propose a pilot project to the Board. This would be in one country for IFYEs to institute some of the program ideas from the committee report.
- World Conference 2018: It was moved and passed that the United States delegation at the Thailand World IFYE Conference in November 2013 issue an invitation to come to the United States for the World Conference in 2018, date and location to be determined.
- **Contracts**: Betty Jo Smith-Roberts reported that contracts have been written or updated for the IFYE Shoppe Manager, Financial Advisor, Newsletter Editor, Webmaster, and Bulk Email Provider. These should come before the Board for approval within the next couple of months.
- Website Redesign Contract: After discussion and viewing of the Website Redesign Contract, it was awarded to Tracy Rhodes of Sierra WebSolutions, LLC in Reno, Nevada. Ginny Warner was appointed as the Association liaison to the contractor.
- **IFYE Returns Campaign:** It was the consensus of the Board members present that Art continue to write creative messages to distribute in order to encourage further donations. Numeric update as of 7/24: \$32,705 has been received from 55 donors. \$26,870 has been received in 2013.
- **Funding for Executive Director:** The Finance Committee should bring a proposal to the Board at the July Conference Call.

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- *Elaine (Ellis) Watson's* global activities include being an exchange student to Germany prior to her IFYE experience in Peru and attending the World IFYE Conference in Australia five years ago. In the 1970s, she also served on the IFYE Association Board of Directors. She and her late husband Bill (MD Italy 1964) hosted several high school exchange students in their home,
- *John H. Wells* first expanded on his IFYE experience by becoming an IFYE Fellow during 1975-76 at which time he received an advanced degree. John is currently Director, Education & Research Division, of USDA Rural Development's Cooperatives Program in Washington, DC. Part of his responsibilities includes briefing/training international delegations (academics; business, finance, and cooperative leaders; and, government officials) on understanding cooperatives and programs serving rural areas. He is currently working on a Foreign Agricultural Service project conducting an assessment of farmer cooperative opportunities in Tunisia (North Africa). To date this year, he has met with/briefed/trained 10 delegations (Seven countries including three 25-member groups alone from China).
- *Mildred (Crawford) Weidemann* was active in IFYE organizations while she worked her way across the U.S. from Virginia to Illinois to Colorado in her positions with Cooperative Extension Service, USDA. She was also charter President of the IFYE Foundation of the USA, Inc.
- *Marj Loyd* has traveled extensively in more than 50 countries. In addition, she has been active in orienting IFYEs on the state level for many years and on the national level for two years.
- *Marla Peterson* served as a research administrator at The Ohio State University before she became the campus-wide Dean for Research and Professor of Counselor Education and Counseling Psychology at The University of Tennessee. At Ohio State, she wrote proposals that resulted in awards from USAID, the World Bank, and the Inter- American Development Bank for efforts in Egypt, Jordan, and Mexico. She chaired a conference held at the United States Department of State for Ministers of Labor from all Latin America and Caribbean nations and worked with a team of university professors to develop a counseling program at St. Petersburg Pedagogical University in St. Petersburg, Russia. She has also authored an article for the National Council of Research Administrators on *Initiating and Managing University-Based International Research and Development Activities.*
- *Maurice Johnson's* experiences include five trips to Sweden (his IFYE host country) and several trips to Japan with Labo. Dwight Palmer, former WA State 4-H Leader, and he initiated the Japanese Labo/4-H exchange over 40 years ago. He has also spent four months in The People's Republic of China as a visiting professor extension education, one month in Kazakhstan with Rockefeller Foundation reviewing extension (ag) types of program, and two trips to Ecuador as the Idaho President of the Partners of the Americas. While Assistant to the Dean, College of Agriculture, he served on a committee to establish a degree program at the University of Idaho in International Programs.
- *Norma (Lawton) Wu* lived with her husband and daughters in Taiwan for 17 months (1980-81). She has stayed active in local IFYE activities in the USA, including the family hosting over 10 international visitors. From the young 22 year-old who said she would "never travel to Asia", Norma has traveled to Australia, China and Japan, as well as traveling on eight trips to Taiwan over the years. Her continuing interest in Taiwan includes being involved in the Formosan Association for Public Affairs (F.A.P.A.) lobbying for Taiwan's recognition as a country separate from China. (*Taiwan is one of only a few countries not recognized by the UN.*)
- *Richard Wagner* has coordinated Rotary Youth Exchanges for the Normal (*Illinois*) Rotary Club. His other main international experiences have included hosting exchangees, taking their family to visit Eileen's (OH 1965) host families in The Netherlands, and two daughters who had international living experiences.
